Historical Background

<u>Historical Background</u>: information about the time and culture of a biblical author and his original audience.

I. Four Steps for Investigating Historical Background:

- 1. Look for links with other passages in the Bible that discuss the same events.
 - a. Psalms, Prophets → Samuel, Kings
 - b. Paul's Epistles → Acts
 - c. Synoptic Gospels
- 2. Be sensitive to historical and cultural references.
- 3. Gather information about the historical and cultural references.
 - a. Bible Dictionary
 - b. Backgrounds of Early Christianity, by Everett Ferguson
 - c. The IVP Bible Background Commentary: Old Testament
 - d. The IVP Bible Background Commentary: New Testament
- 4. Determine the impact the passage would have had in its original setting.

II. Discussion of 1 Kings 16-18

Survey

- Date: written when Israel was exiled in Babylon.
- Purpose: to explain why the exile occurred. Israel was exiled because they forsook the Lord and worshipped other gods.
- 1 Kings 11: the nation of Israel divides in two
 - Jeroboam leads a rebellion
 - o Judah in the South, Israel in the North
 - o Jeroboam creates an idolatrous religion to compete with worship of God.
- Chapters 16-18 take place a couple generations later.
